WHAT DO YOU ENJOY MOST ABOUT TEACHING?

As a teacher, I have the opportunity to see children grow and have a small part to play in that growth. I see my role as two-fold. First, I prepare the environment for learning. More than anything, I want students to take control of their learning. The more care I can take to make the physical classroom space work for them, and make learning materials accessible to them, the more they feel that autonomy. Further, the more I prepare behind the scenes when getting ready to introduce a concept, the more meaningful the few minutes I am the center of student's attention will be. Second, I am a tour guide through that environment. Once students want to know something, I step in and guide them through the process of exploration, then step back and let them experience the wonder of learning for themselves. A tour guide is not the star of the show, rather a means to the acquisition of new knowledge and skills, who then fades into the background.

WHAT IS THE MOST IMPORTANT THING YOU HOPE STUDENTS LEARN FROM YOU?

I hope that my students learn to love learning! I hope that by providing them with a supportive and engaging learning environment, they can all develop the confidence and curiosity to support them as life-long learners. With their own appreciation for learning, they can better recognize how the learning process looks different for all students. As a result, they will have more of their own internal motivation, and be able to support and encourage their classmates as well.

"The most significant thing a teacher can do for their students is show that they care."
